We have certainly been blessed with some wonderful weather to finish out our fall season and begin the winter. We are also preparing for our first Virtual IAA Annual Meeting. This meeting is certainly quite different from years past and not how I would have wished to spend my first IAA Annual Meeting as President, but I have high hopes that next year will be back to normal, and if possible, I can represent our County at that event. Resolutions this year were sent out to county delegates to review on Zoom with IFB President and Vice President prior to our business meeting. Submittals were sent following the Zoom meeting, and then voting on Resolutions took place online. Quite a bit different than in the past as I'm sure many of you that have participated in years past will agree. Our Business meeting on December 5th, which consisted of President Guebert's address, approval of past minutes, treasurers report, consideration of Resolutions and election of Directors, all done and over in 1.5 hours! Covid has certainly changed how many things took place this past year, but we are hopeful for a somewhat normal to begin soon!

As we begin 2021, we are aware that the Governmental Affairs Conference that is normally held in February has already been canceled and will become a virtual conference with more details to follow as they become finalized.

IFB is working with IDOA on the New Anhydrous Ammonia safety training requirements for growers, and that deadline has now been extended to April 1, 2022.

Sangamon County will be working on our schedule of activities for the upcoming year and making those plans as the Governor lifts restrictions.

Be watching for a new Nomination Form coming out for our Annual Farmer Hall of Fame Recipient. Staff has put together a form for members to fill out if you know of someone you would like to see nominated for this award. All applications will be reviewed by our Farmer Hall of Fame Committee and the recipient selected. If you haven't visited our website recently, sangamonfb.org I would urge you to do so. All these recipients have been added to our website and it is being updated continuously to keep our members aware of what is happening in the county.

As we begin this New Year, I am eager to work with the committees and all our volunteers to work to accomplish our Mission: Advocating the Voice of Agriculture Through Education and Grassroots Legislation.

I will close my article unfortunately on a sad note: Jack Oakley, who hired me 43 years ago to work at the Farm Bureau Office past today, December 2, 2020. Jack was my boss for 22 years but he never really seemed like a boss, he was more like a Step-Dad. William N Etherton Scholarship



The William N. Etherton Agricultural Scholarship Fund was created in conjunction with the Sangamon County Farm Bureau Foundation in 2019 by his family. The objective is to award one Sangamon County student who is pursuing a degree in Agriculture a \$500 scholarship. The Scholarship Fund was created to honor the memory of William N. "Bill" Etherton who passed away on September 18, 2019. Bill, of Buffalo, Illinois, was raised on the family farm and married Peggy Higginson in 1946. He was then enlisted in the 11th Airborne Division as a paratrooper and served in Japan for two years. Upon his return, he and Peggy started raising corn, beans, hogs, cattle, and their four children. Bill was also a member of the Sangamon County Farm Bureau Board, Pork Producers, Sangamon County Extension Council, Mechanicsburg Farmers Grain Elevator, 4-H leader in Lanesville, Illiopolis School Board, Illini Bank and one of the founding members of the Mechanicsburg Citizens Bank. Bill believed that giving young people an opportunity to study agriculture is an important step to ensuring that American agriculture remains the world leader in food, fiber, and fuel.

Highlights of Jack Oakley as SCFB Manager



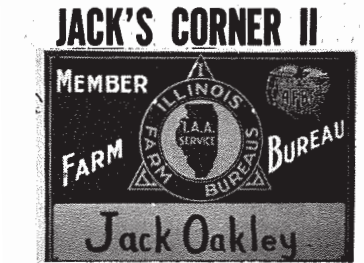

Sangamon County Farm Bureau 2020 Accomplishments



Raised \$13,100 to be distributed to the exhibitors of our Sangamon County Youth Expo Livestock Show.

Held our 10th Annual Foundation Golf Outing and raised funds for scholarships.

The Women's Committee delivered their healthy harvest buckets with snacks to farmers in the field.

Provided \$6,250 in college scholarships to students from Sangamon County.

The Young Leader Committee picked and donated 3,740 pounds of sweet corn for the local food banks.

Hosted the FFA Chapters of Sangamon County for an FFA Acquaintance Day with a tour of Springfield Plastics, Scoular Company and LLCC

The Governmental Engagement & Policy Committee distributed 140 Vote No yard signs and banners to help defeat the Progressive Income Tax Constitutional Tax Amendment.

Marketing Committee hosted their Annual Corn Yield Survey and shared the results with the county and our members.

Supported many local charities with Christmas hams, hat & glove donations, and volunteer time.

Inducted Sam Snell into the Farmer Hall of Farm and named Cyd Ayers the Farm Woman of the Year.

Through the pandemic, farming continued, and so did Illinois Farm Bureau's efforts to support its members.

Defeated the Progressive Income Tax Constitutional Amendment with a **strong statewide grassroots campaign.**

Participated in the Pritzker administration's renewable energy working groups to **advocate for renewable energy** policy that benefits agriculture and implements IFB policies.

Responded to additional stress caused by the pandemic by partnering with experts nationwide to **advocate and educate** on farmer **mental health and wellness.**

Strengthened bipartisan Congressional relationships to advance **Farm Bureau's voice** during hearings on trade, Commodity Credit Corporation replenishment and renewable fuel waivers.

Lobbied for state and federal **financial assistance for farmers** from the CARES program, resulting in the Payment Protection Program (PPP), Coronavirus Food Assistance Program (CFAP) and Livestock Management Facilities Act Business Interruption Grant Program.

The Young Leader Committee **raised over \$21,000** through Harvest for All to **aid the eight Feeding Illinois food banks** at the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Filed a "Friend of the Court" brief defending the constitutionality of the Farm Nuisance Suit Act (FNSA), opening the door for the 4th District Appellate Court's decision to **preserve a farmer's ability to fight these legal battles.**

County Farm Bureaus donated over **\$75,000 worth of milk** and meat to local food pantries **across the state.**

Helped ensure agriculture was considered an **essential business.**
